Lawrance Cup – date changed to October 1st, 2017

The Lawrance Cup Race was moved from June 18th to October 1st this year. This race is an anything goes race around the bell buoy.

Vancouver Lake Sailing Club June Regatta – June 10 and 11, 2017

Two KYC boats travelled to Vancouver, Washington for this regatta. Chris Duncombe, finished in second place, the best finish ever for a KYC boat at the Vancouver Lake regatta. Chris, skipper of Too Tense, and sailed with his regular crew, Jane Henley from KYC, and Scott Barrar from VLSC.

The second KYC boat was Ozone, skipper Menno Bos and his regular KYC crew Tracy Lau and Ury Segal.

Report from Fleet Captain, Chris Duncombe

There were 33 boats in total including 9 Lightnings and two boats from KYC and 6 races (2 on Day 1, 4 on Day 2).

Lightning regatta dominated by Bob Bush and his team, so whatever new mast they gave him after his mishap coming up to Kits last year has made him very fast. We'll all have to come up with some speed improvements if we are going to challenge this team at Kits. He was certainly the quickest boat upwind and was getting terrific starts. We were a solid 2nd, coming 2nd in all races but one where we came 3rd. Menno had a solid regatta finishing 6th, and if not for missing race 2 could easily have ended up in 4th place. Also, his best result at VLSC I believe.

Saturday conditions: Rain & no wind to start the day. Race 1 started in a light to moderate southerly breeze (unusual) when a sudden storm passed through with the wind swinging round to the west & picking up to a steady 10-12 knots, gusting at 15 knots (my guess). Race 2 underway in similar conditions with the majority of the Lightning fleet back at the dock, possibly concerned about a worsening storm with possible electrical activity. Wind lightened at the start of Race 3 and continued to get lighter & starting to swing back to the north, until race abandoned when we were $\frac{3}{4}$ up the first leg. Sunday conditions were more stable with a steady 8-10 knots north westerly (more typical VLSC wind direction) allowing us to sail 4 good races.

Pacific Reach News

After doing 5km -8km short races from January to April, the Pacific Reach paddlers kicked off their distance season on Skaha Lake, Penticton against teams from Kelowna, Harrison Lake, Kamloops, Vancouver, Penticton, Nanaimo and Calgary. Our Mixed Team (3 women, 3 men) set the fastest race time in the 15km long course. The Men's Team were 3rd overall in their division. Wine tasting was the treat after race day.

As the season progresses the Canadian Outrigger Racing Association race distances increase from 15km to 25km. Pacific Reach just returned from a fun weekend in Kelowna placing 1st in the 18km course. More races are ahead at Barnet Marine Park, Bowen Island, Harrison Lake, Victoria, plus, travelling to Hawaii in August to compete in the epic 29km Iron race from Kailua-KONA to Honaunau Bay. This is World's largest long-distance outrigger canoe race that was actually started in 1972 with over 200 Teams from around the World attending ... followed by a huge awards Luau dinner and a chance to meet competitors from all the countries. Kits Invitational Regatta – July 8 and 9, 2017

The Kits Invitational Regatta is one of two large sailing regattas held at KYC each year (The Bluenose regatta is held in the fall). We are expecting six fleets to participate in the Kits Invitational this year, M242, Lightning, 505, Cal20, Star, and F18. Our friends from Vancouver Lake Sailing Club will be here and we hope to welcome boats from other parts of Washington as well.

The Kits Invitational is extra special for two fleets; it is designated a Canadian Championship for the Cal20 fleet and for the Lightning fleet, it is designated as the PNW District Championships.

The KYC homepage, (kitsilanoyachtclub.com) has the Notice of Race, (NOR), and registration is now available. An early Registration Discount is available until midnight June 30, 2017.

Know your Club

Know your Club is now focusing on the Club Directors and Honourary Officers and this month the Honourary Hydrographer position is in the spotlight. Kerry Brann is the KYC Honourary Hydrographer and he has provided the following informative, and very interesting, explanation.

What is an Honourary Hydrographer anyway?

For the purposes of our club, this position is strictly honorary and in no way implies there is any formal scientific education involved, it's merely a fun title for the racing equipment guy.



It's interesting to note that World Hydrography Day is celebrated in June.

WHD is celebrated each year on June 21st.

On 29th November 2005, the United Nations adopted Resolution A/60/30, that includes the statement, Welcomes the adoption by the International Hydrographic Organization of the World Hydrography Day, to be celebrated annually on 21 June, with the aim of giving suitable publicity to its work at all level and of increasing the coverage of hydrographic information on a global basis, and urges all States to work with that organization to promote safe navigation, especially in the areas of international navigation, ports and where there are vulnerable or protected marine areas.

The Importance of Hydrography

In addition to supporting safe and efficient navigation of ships, hydrography underpins almost every other activity associated with the sea, including: resource exploitation - fishing, minerals, and the following:

Environmental protection and management

Maritime boundary delimitation

National marine spatial data infrastructures

Recreational boating (This is where the racing equipment guy limits his scope)

Maritime defence and security

Tsunami flood and inundation modelling

Coastal zone management

Tourism


Our club has many integral parts to manage in order to keep the fun happening. The role of the Honorary Hydrographer is just a small part of it. The HH, or racing equipment guy, ensures we have enough equipment and that it's in good working condition for the many events that we host.

There are various types of equipment that are used in conjunction with Sailing Instructions (SI), and the racing rules of sailing. The SI generally have a course layout where the on the water racing equipment is utilized. This equipment is meant to float and is essentially the floating

traffic signals that are meant to be crossed or rounded in order to start, navigate and finish the race course according to the race map in the SI. These pieces of equipment (floating colored marks and pins with flags) are tethered to anchors that hold them to the ocean floor with enough scope to the line so as not to drag.

There is also the racing equipment on the Race Committee boat that is used for communicating with the yachts involved in the racing. This equipment consists of flags of all sorts for designating who is racing and what race diagram they will use in the SI and how many times they will race the circuit. There are flags to communicate penalties for being on the course side before the start and or within 1 minute of the start. There are flags for changes to the course and a dreaded flag for when the wind dies and no one can finish. One for postponing while waiting for wind or changing the setup of on the water race equipment. Aside from all the visual aids there is sound signaling equipment in the form of air horns, electric horns and whistles. There is communication equipment for the Race Committee boat, chase and safety boats to stay in touch with the Principal Race Officer, (PRO), pens and paper for recording scores, timers, Windometers, etc.


A typical layout for a race course although many different configurations can be made.

Jane Henley was in Hong Kong Dragon Boat racing in June and Jane and her team were 2nd in the international women's 18 boat.

Jane provided this update for The Hailer, "After talking with other team mates we think there were around 25 teams in total, including teams from Canada, Australia, United Kingdom, New Zealand, Taiwan, Singapore, USA, Japan, and Indonesia.

The top 9 or 10 international woman's teams went against the top Chinese women's team. So the pool was 18 teams in total and we came in 9th. Extremely excited re that result. The races took place over 3 days in hot humid conditions."



Obituary - Joan Dexter - March 24, 1931 to May 08, 2017

Joan and her husband Dick were Club Stewards from 1975 until 1978. Prior to, and following their stint as stewards, the Dexters were active members of the (at that time extremely popular and active) Enterprise Fleet.

The 1973 Enterprise World Championship was held in English Bay. Seventy boats competed and Dick and Joan finished second.

Joan was also an active participant in other sports. In curling, she was skip of the rink that won the B.C. Ladies Championship and went on to place fourth at the Nationals in 1980. In their retirement years, Dick and Joan moved to Sechelt and she took up golfing and joined sailing, curling and lawn bowling clubs.

As Club Steward, Joan was famous for her sandwiches, soups and sweets. These were available before and after races and served from a window in the kitchen of the Steward's quarters.

Current Club members who were young sailors at the time, have very fond memories of Joan. They recall how she mothered and mentored them beating them at Ping Pong and cutting their hair when she thought it needed it.

Kits Chronicles by Barbara Dill

1986 Kitsilano Invitational

Yacht clubs traditionally host invitational regattas. Members of other yacht clubs and sailing clubs are invited to compete. Kitsilano Yacht Club's Invitational Regatta has historically taken place early in July.

The regatta in 1986 was described by the Fleet Captain, John Pearson, in the following manner: "This year's Kits Invitational may well be remembered in some people's minds as the Kits Invitational Obstacle Race."

Along with the ninety-nine regatta participants, English Bay on Saturday hosted a sail past that included several tall ships, naval vessels and a fireboat from Tacoma Washington. The resulting flotilla made for a challenging approach to the start line. As John described it, "Your Fleet Captain, in particular, found himself in the left corner trying to sail through the wash from the Tacoma fireboat."

There was no relief on Sunday as the Bay filled with competitors in the Bathtub Race. John compared sailing in the cross chop that weekend as "trying to sail through a mogul field".

John knew about moguls as he and his wife Janet were avid skiers as well as successful Enterprise sailors. The Pearsons, with Janet serving as helmsman, won the Canadian Enterprise Championship that year, scoring 3 first places and 2 second place finishes in the 6-race regatta.


Thursday nights






I arrived at the club about 5:30 Saturday evening and went to find Menno and the KYC group. I found Chris and Jane...

History of the regatta courtesy of Wikipedia

A regatta is a series of boat races. The term typically describes racing events of rowed or sailed water craft, although some powerboat race series are also called regattas. A regatta often includes social and promotional activities which surround the racing event, and except in the case of boat type (or "class") championships, is usually named for the town or venue where the event takes place.

Although regattas are typically amateur competitions, they are usually formally structured events, with comprehensive rules describing the schedule and procedures of the event. Regattas may be organized as championships for a particular area or type of boat, but are often held just for the joy of competition, camaraderie, and general promotion of the sport.

Sailing race events are typically held for a single class (a single model of boat, such as the Islander 36) and usually last more than one day. Regattas may be hosted by a yacht club, sailing association, town or school as in the case of the UK's National School Sailing Association and Interscholastic Sailing Association (high school) regattas or Intercollegiate Sailing Association (college) regattas. Currently, The Three Bridge Fiasco, conducted by the Singlehanded Sailing Society of San Francisco Bay with more than 350 competitors is the largest sailboat race in the United States.

One of the largest and most popular rowing regattas is the Henley Royal Regatta held on the River Thames, England. One of the largest and oldest yachting regattas in the world is Cowes Week, which is held annually by the Royal Yacht Squadron in Cowes, England, and usually attracts over 900 sailboats. Cowes Week is predated by the Cumberland Cup (1775), Port of Dartmouth Royal Regatta (1822) and Port of Plymouth Regatta (1823). North America's oldest regatta is the Royal St. John's Regatta held on Quidi Vidi Lake in St. John's, Newfoundland every year since 1818.

The **Royal St. John's Regatta** is the only civic holiday in Canada that is dependent on the weather. "The Regatta" has been traditionally held on the first Wednesday in August.

On the night before residents of the historic city have the option to stay at home and have a quiet night or "roll the dice" and *PARTY!!* The choice has become known as "**Regatta Roulette.**"

As resident's party into the night, refreshment (s) in hand, there is always the lingering question, when I turn on the radio at 6:00 a.m. will the Royal Regatta officials say, "**IT IS A GO**" or will it be a day at work?

An estimated 35,000 -50,000 people go to lake side at Quidi Vidi Lake, St. John's to enjoy the races and the concessions.

The Royal Victoria Yacht Club was founded in June 1892 and is the oldest yacht club in western Canada and the Royal Vancouver Yacht Club was formed in 1903.
